

## E-safety Links and Resources

**Think u Know Website** <http://www.thinkuknow.co.uk> Resources which encourage young people to have fun with new technology, whilst staying in control of the risks. Importantly, they also signpost where a child can go if they have any concerns. Resources have been created for Key Stages 1- 4 and can be accessed for free once you register on this site.



**Think U Know** - [http://www.thinkuknow.co.uk/5\\_7/](http://www.thinkuknow.co.uk/5_7/) provides a section for KS1 pupils which includes Hector's World, a series of activities and cartoons based around a dolphin and his underwater friends. It also provides a screensaver that can be downloaded onto computers, providing pupils with a 'panic button' to hide the contents of the screen should they be exposed to content that makes them feel uncomfortable. Also useful for KS2.

**Think U Know** - [http://www.thinkuknow.co.uk/8\\_10/](http://www.thinkuknow.co.uk/8_10/) - has a specific section for KS2 pupils which balances safety advice with the benefits of using communications technologies. Pupils should be made aware of the reporting facility that the site provides. The Think U Know **Cybercafe** - [http://www.thinkuknow.co.uk/8\\_10/cybercafe/Cyber-Cafe-Base/](http://www.thinkuknow.co.uk/8_10/cybercafe/Cyber-Cafe-Base/) is a particularly useful teaching resource which covers most of the technologies that KS2 pupils will use, including email, instant messaging, chat rooms and mobile phones. Pupils are guided through simulations of each technology that address key teaching points.



**Know it All** <http://www.childnet-int.org/kia/primary> is Childnet's suite of education resources designed to help educate parents, teachers and young people about safe and positive use of the internet. Currently there are 4 resources for Parents and Carers, Secondary Schools, Primary Schools and Trainee Teachers and all four resources include content for young people. You can access all these online for free. It includes an interactive teaching resource and lesson plans that can be used with children from around Y2 upwards, called Captain Kara and Winston's SMART Adventure. This introduces pupils to the five SMART rules. The video tutorials for teachers include one on working with parents and one looking at pupils with special educational needs.

This animation, on the [www.netsmarkkids.org](http://www.netsmarkkids.org) website, reminds pupils of some of the things that the Internet can be used for. It's short and can be watched altogether on an Interactive whiteboard, or in small groups at a computer.





This cartoon, on the [iKeepSafe.org](http://www.ikeepsafe.org) website, reinforces the message that pupils shouldn't give any personal information out when using the Internet, or arrange to meet anyone they talk to online. It is short and can be easily watched with the whole class on an interactive whiteboard.




[Cybersmartkids](http://www.cybersmartkids.com) is an Australian site provides simple information for pupils as well as providing downloadable booklets and posters.

**DVD and Interactive Resource** ChildNet have created an interactive follow-up resource to complement the excellent DVD 'Let's Fight It Together' which reinforces the messages arising from the film. 'Using the technology that children are using, the cyberbullying interactive allows children to log on to a computer and create their own character that goes into the same school where cyberbullying has taken place. Pupils have the opportunity to experience a day at school with the main character, Joe, and make decisions about how to help someone who is being cyberbullied. In the course of this they will find out how responsible a digital citizen they are and they will also find out more about keeping safe online.' Pupils working their way through the resource receive a 'score' at the end telling them how good a 'digizen' or digital citizen they are, and the resource should help schools capitalise on the issues raised through the DVD.
